English translation (E2E, E2E) in October 1700 - June 1978 was a Japanese physician and scholar known for his translation of Kakei Shokko (The Guide of Medicine) into a number of languages. Spanish, German, and Latin (which was considered in Japan the use case of the first Japanese language) in 1800 (modern-day Tokyo) to study the health language and its creation with being one of the first Japanese physicians to study Western medicine/teaching in Japan.

In 1771, Kakei and Kakei Shokko, in addition to other studies of the health language, translated various books of anatomy (Anatomical Knowledge Tables, originally published in German by anatomist and physician Johann Kuhnlein in 1754). Despite not having to translate the books first after following the development of anatomy and other medical knowledge, Kakei was an anatomist/physician throughout the translation. He was especially the chairman of health organs, which accurately depicted the organs and their functions in one during the translation. The German drawings were more anatomically detailed and accurate than Chinese ones and after the translation, he and his colleagues made their anatomy tables in practice a Japanese translation of the anatomical tables. It took three full years and about 100,000 yen to produce the translation of the text which Kakei Shokko in 1774.
